Juneteenth honors the June 19th, 1865, date when Union troops reached Galveston Bay, Texas and informed the 'last' enslaved people of the Emancipation Proclamation, signed more than 2.5 years earlier by President Lincoln. On this date, more than 250,000 people learned that they were free, which is why Juneteenth is often also referred to as "Freedom Day."

June 19th has since become a day to celebrate, reflect on the past and fight for a just future, and gather with family and community. In 2021, Juneteenth became a Federal Holiday and, as always, I invite you to think about this as a day to 'take on' rather than a day off. This is an opportunity to volunteer at one of the local celebrations or to continue learning about the history of Juneteenth and ongoing efforts towards racial justice in the U.S.

<u>The National Museum of African American History & Culture</u> at the Smithsonian (which our TRIO students had the opportunity to visit this Spring!) has great information and resources to learn more about Juneteenth.




